# Resilience in Action

## Dear New York Public Radio Community,

As we reflect on the challenges our city and nation have faced over the last few years, one word resonates loudly, over and over again.

### **Resilience.**

To be resilient is to be able to withstand tremendous challenges. To change and adapt as the ground shifts under our feet. But resilience is not only the ability to persevere. It is the stubborn determination to find joy, come together, and be bold and creative—in the face of whatever may come our way.

Resilience is the stuff our city is made of. It's paved into our streets and written into our collective psyche. And it is fueled by the essential public service only New York Public Radio can provide.

**When we couldn't enter each other's homes**, the hosts on our airwaves made their way in, as familiar voices and trusted guides.

**When people couldn't tell up from down**, WNYC and Gothamist cut through the noise with critical plain-speech explainers, breaking down everything from COVID case numbers and citywide reopenings to the rollout of ranked-choice voting.

**When the cultural community was struggling**, we launched the WQXR STAR program, a pandemic support initiative giving emerging classical artists a platform to create new work, and providing NYC cultural institutions \$1.5 million in free promotion on our airwaves.

**When our city's most treasured communal traditions were at risk of not happening**, we partnered with The Public and Lincoln Center to transform Shakespeare in the Park and Mostly Mozart for radio, amplifying their reach by an order of magnitude.

**When rioters stormed the U.S. capitol**, *The Brian Lehrer Show* mounted a series of national call-in specials about a nation on the brink, running through the first 100 days of the Biden administration.

And this only skims the surface of the ways New York Public Radio strove to be responsive and meet the moment, as we experienced countless seismic shifts. New York Public Radio teams led local and national conversations and influenced public policy. They were recognized with numerous honors, including three duPont-Columbia Awards. We provided our community with the tools, information, and inspiration they needed to stay strong and resilient. And we, in turn, were able to do the same because of the support of our generous members and donors.

Thank you for everything you do, on behalf of New York Public Radio and everyone we serve.

While we were separated by the pandemic, New York Public Radio forged community with a monthly virtual book club, "**Get Lit with All of It**," in partnership with the New York Public Library. We opened the phones to talk on ***The Brian Lehrer Show*** and ***The United States of Anxiety***.

**WQXR** offered a reprieve with the joy and power of classical music, and, through **The Greene Space**, hosted outdoor music events such as pop-up Mostly Mozart concerts in all five boroughs, in conjunction with Lincoln Center.

During this most extraordinary year—that began in July 2020 as the initial COVID-19 rampage through New York was temporarily abating—we were resilient in all aspects of our operations, so that we could be there for our City and our listeners.

# In FY21...

...people spent more time listening to WNYC FM and WQXR weekly (six hours) than any other FM station in the market, in every month.

...esteemed New Jersey journalist **Michael Hill** became the new voice of *Morning Edition* and veteran WNYC reporter **Sean Carlson** became the host of *All Things Considered*.

...Gothamist developed the **COVID-19 Tracker** and provided up-to-date science information and health guidance.

...WQXR launched the **Artist Propulsion Lab**, a new grant program for six early- and mid-career New York area musicians.

...*On the Media* brought you its 20th year of comprehensive media analysis.

...*Radiolab* welcomed new hosts: **Lulu Miller**, *Radiolab* alum and co-founder of NPR's *Invisibilia*; and **Latif Nasser**, longtime Director of Research and host of the acclaimed podcast mini-series *The Other Latif*.

...WNYC's **Kai Wright** transformed the podcast *The United States of Anxiety*, a show about the unfinished business of our history and its grip on our future, into a weekly live call-in show where listeners could process history together in real time.

...WNYC reached #1 during morning drive time in November and stayed there for 5 months straight (Nov-Apr).

As fewer and fewer local news outlets exist to provide fact-based journalism, we brought you...



...watchdog journalism on the City’s many problems at the polls. **Brigid Bergin** broke the story of nearly 100,000 incorrect ballots sent to voters in Brooklyn and Queens, leading legislators and citizens to demand action from the Board of Elections.



...a look at the profound toll that the pandemic took on men in New Jersey’s Latino communities, and the multiple reasons why COVID-19 disproportionately impacted the state. **Karen Yi** reported this series for ***The Takeaway***.



...ongoing coverage of the response to the pandemic from the nation’s largest public school system. **Jessica Gould** continued to examine how the pandemic affected teaching and learning and we became a go-to resource for parents on fast-changing rules and conditions in the schools as they reopened.



...an investigation of rampant police corruption in Mount Vernon by **George Joseph** in partnership with *Esquire* and Gothamist. This piece led directly to disciplinary action against offending officers and a Federal Civil Rights investigation.

We produced...

...***America Are We Ready?***, a series of 11 national call-in shows hosted by Brian Lehrer from September 2020 through the first 100 days of the Biden administration. The series elevated the voices and concerns of listeners across the country and reached audiences on 263 public radio stations nationwide.



...essential reporting on the tech platform Zello, which served as a home for militia recruitment and organizing during, and long before, the January insurrection. This coverage by **Micah Lowinger** from ***On the Media***, in collaboration with the newsroom, was used by the FBI to identify multiple insurrectionists.



...coverage of dozens of daily **Black Lives Matter demonstrations** in all five NYC boroughs, including Mott Haven in the Bronx, which prompted a Human Rights Watch report that found that the NYPD committed human rights violations—and led to some protesters being released from jail.



...the nationwide call-in show, ***The United States of Anxiety***, exploring our lives during the pandemic, a summer of protest and activism, and the blow to our nation's peaceful transfer of power. **Kai Wright** asked, who matters in America?



...an extended series by ***The Takeaway*** before the 2020 election which interrogated the media's often-monolithic view of Latino voters. ***The Takeaway*** team addressed common misconceptions and examined the many subgroups among the record number of Latino voters, providing insight into the 2020 and future elections.



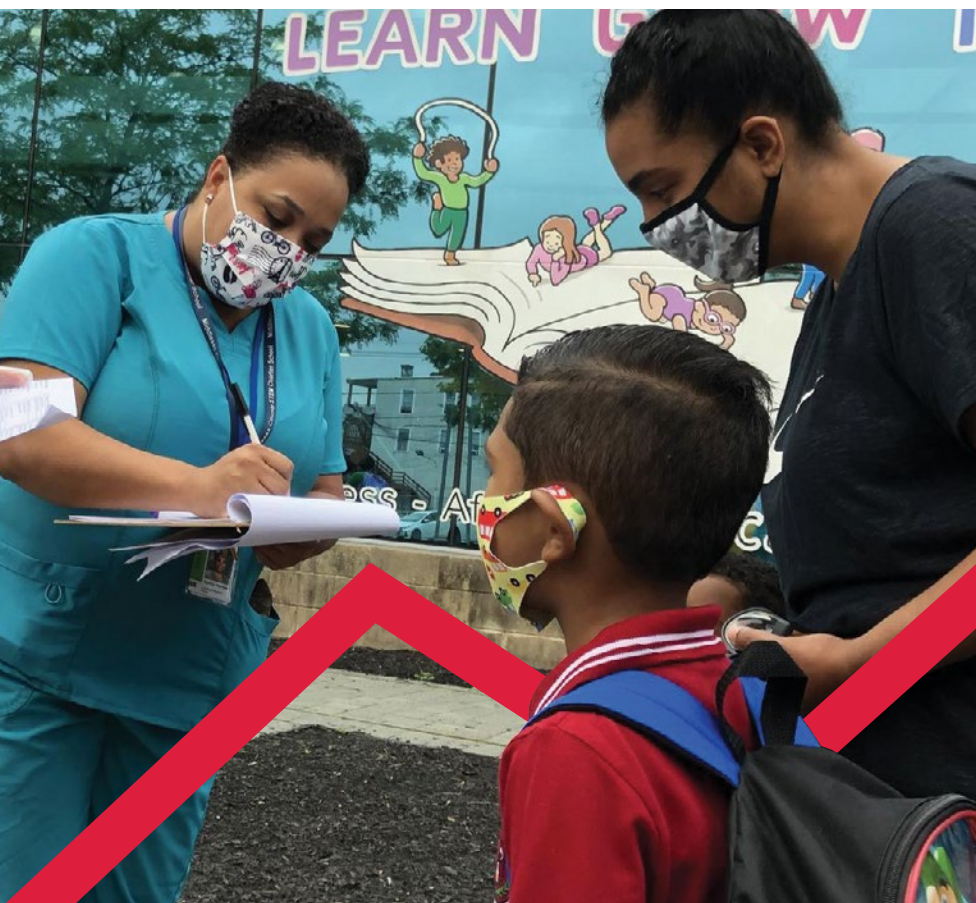

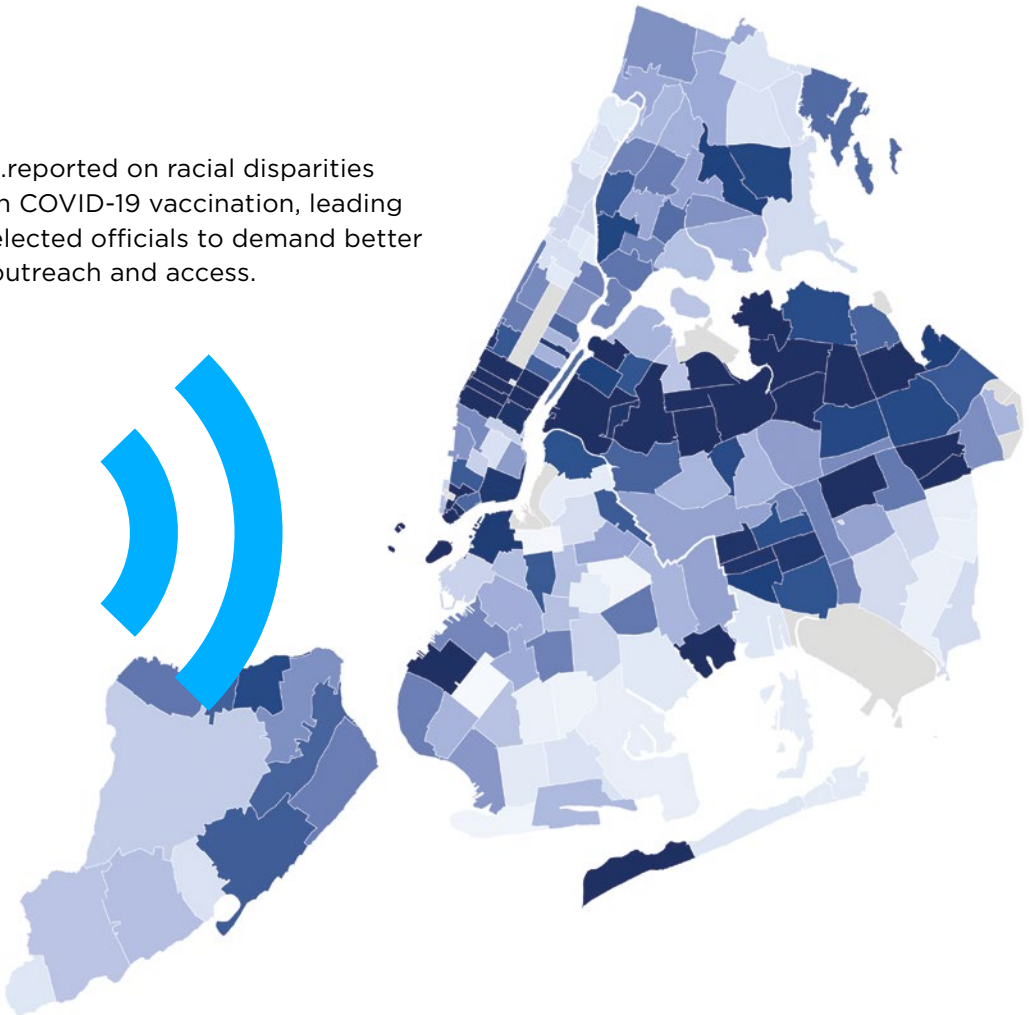
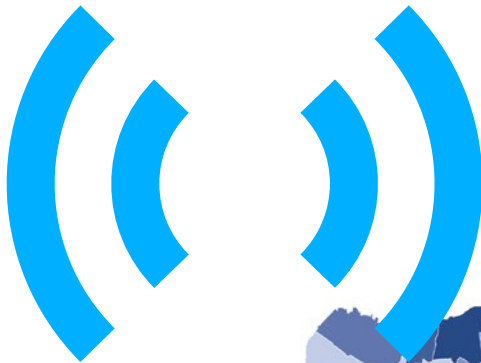

WQXR is one of the nation's most listened-to classical music stations. We make extraordinary music accessible without barriers.



When New York's concert halls were dark, WQXR's role as a torchbearer for classical music became more important than ever, as we...



...reimagined the **Mostly Mozart Festival** as a multimedia experience, preserving Lincoln Center's summer mainstay when audiences could not gather in person. WQXR presented a suite of original programming, which included a series of pop-up concerts presented live in each of the five boroughs and streamed online, and **Camp Wolfgang**, a virtual kids' fair for our youngest listeners.



...celebrated **Juneteenth** with a **24-hour marathon** of music by composers and performers of African descent from the 16th century to the present.



...continued to feature **John Schaefer's New Sounds**, a familiar voice introducing the up-and-coming and the hidden gems of all musical genres to sustain and enlighten.



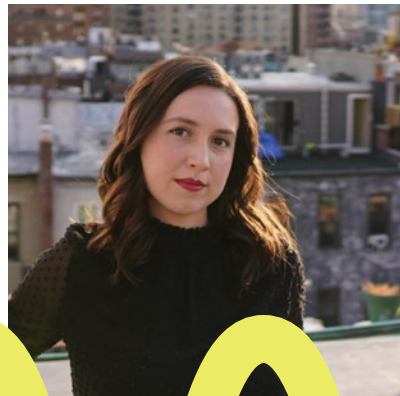
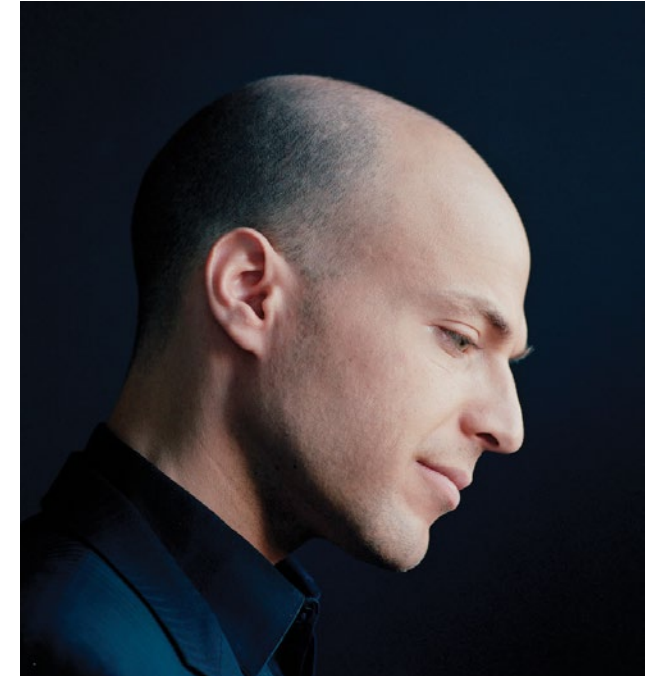




...explored the ***Black Experience In The Concert Hall*** with host **Terrance McKnight**. In this format-breaking live call-in show, Terrance McKnight was joined by Black luminaries to share the challenges they face in classical music, career highlights, and a shared passion for the art form.



...sustained local artists, orchestras, and nonprofits through the **WQXR STAR (Salutes The ARTs)** initiative, which provided access to our platforms, \$1.5 million dollars worth of complimentary on-air promotions, and sustained partnerships with our city's most beloved artists and institutions—including Apollo Theater, 92Y, Harlem Chamber Players, New York Philharmonic, Orchestra of St. Luke's, and Roundabout Theatre.





# WNYC STUDIOS

WNYC Studios is a leading producer of podcasts that inform and inspire. In FY21, many of our podcasts explored questions around the nature of the “American experience.”



From the past...



**Blindspot: Tulsa Burning**, in partnership with The History Channel and KOSU in Oklahoma, and hosted by **KalaLea**, the podcast tells the story of the events that led to the Tulsa Race Massacre and destruction of the thriving Black residential and business community nicknamed “Black Wall Street.” It won the prestigious duPont-Columbia Award.

To the present...

**Radiolab’s, “The Flag and the Fury”** examined the complicated past of the Mississippi state flag.



**The Experiment: Stories From an Unfinished Country** probed the contradictions and realities of our national ideals. This podcast was co-produced with *The Atlantic* and was an Apple Podcasts Top Ten for 2021.

**La Brega: Stories of the Puerto Rican Experience** explored *la brega* (the struggle) that defines so many aspects of life on an island that is part of, but not integrated into, America. Produced in both English and Spanish, this series was created in partnership with Futuro Media, and was named by *The New York Times* and *The New Yorker* as one of the 10 best podcasts of 2021.



**The New Yorker Radio Hour** covered topics from a summer of activism and protests to *The New Yorker* writers’ reflections on the convulsions of former president Trump’s final days in office.



**Anna Sale** continued to have the hard conversations on **Death, Sex & Money**, from a conversation with Supreme Court Justice Sonya Sotomayor, to the mini-series **Game Changer**, which dove into the many ways that COVID-19 upended the lives of athletes.

Live and archived videos from The Greene Space garnered 2.8 million views in FY21 as we found ways to safely host live performances during the pandemic...



...**The Harlem Chamber Players** presented an immersive video performance series filmed across New York City and streamed online. The series included an exploration of grief and healing through music, dance and poetry at Brooklyn's historic Green-Wood Cemetery.



...**The Catalyst Quartet: Uncovered** offered rare performances of works by historically important and contemporary Black composers, bringing to light these beautifully crafted and, in some cases, never-recorded works.



...**Imara Jones: Lives at Stake** presented frank conversations by and for trans people about the issues facing their communities. The series was hosted by The Greene Space's first-ever Journalist-in-Residence, Emmy and Peabody Award winner, Imara Jones.



...**First People's Week**, our first-ever multi-day celebration of North American Indigenous life and history, featured Native creators, artists, podcasters, poets, photographers, and others for vibrant conversations on land treaties, mascots, Indigenous representation, and storytelling. Community leaders from The Lenape Center and the American Indian Community House helped to design this event.

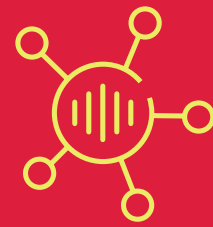

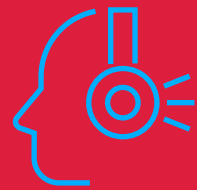
