As I listened to Tony share his story, I felt a surprising tightness in my chest. It was surprising because I am not a parent, empathizing in the way that I imagine a parent could... and though I am no stranger to heartbreak, it's still an odd thing to feel that deeply for someone you've never met, or even seen, given the nature of podcasting. Yet, I experienced such a visceral response to the pain and loss that Tony must have suffered. And after thinking about it more and admiring how gracefully you navigate difficult emotions and subject matter as an interviewer, I felt particularly grateful for people who are willing to share such profoundly personal experiences... which somehow makes this world feel just a little smaller. And to me, that is heroic.

And so I suppose I want to thank you both for moving me so deeply. Emotional transparency can be hard to come by, especially with the manicured way we sometimes portray our lives through social media... so I just wanted to acknowledge the connection that can happen when we have the courage to share our wounds with others. -Sara


