THE NEW YORK CONVERSATION AND THE SOUNDSCAPE OF THE CITY



2024 was a big year for New York Public Radio, as we rang in 100 years of WNYC.

The landmark anniversary of our Centennial affords an opportunity to celebrate a towering legacy of service—of WNYC and the expanded civic asset we have become with the addition of WQXR, Gothamist, WNYC Studios, and The Jerome L. Greene Performance Space. At the same time, it comes during a moment of challenge and uncertainty: a divided nation, continued global turmoil, and ongoing threats to journalism and the arts.

Against this backdrop, the importance of our work rings louder than ever. This threshold moment is both exciting and urgent—calling for creativity, innovation, and determination.

Toward that aim, we are deepening our impact for the years ahead, while doubling down on the essential public services we provide in the present: news, talk, music, and cultural programming that informs and inspires the public, changes policy, leads local and national conversations, and wins awards.

The WNYC app was rebuilt from the ground up, evolving the digital platform to better connect with the next generation of news consumers, and enhancing the local-national-global coverage format that is public media's hallmark.

Our work won numerous industry accolades, including a duPont-Columbia University Award and two Edward R. Murrow Awards.

The newsroom mounted several groundbreaking investigations, including sustained reporting on sexual assault at Rikers Island and other jails, which led to immediate action from lawmakers, city council members, and the Bronx DA.

WQXR reached new audiences by partnering with other NYC cultural institutions on projects including the podcast *If This Hall Could Talk*, with Carnegie Hall; and mounting Classical Kids Fairs in Brooklyn and Queens that brought the joy of classical music to nearly 3,000 participants.

Radiolab's innovative kids' show Terrestrials partnered with WNET and PBS Learning Media to make the program available to children and educators with new interactive resources, extending the show's impact.

As we reflect on a century of public service media, we come back to our very first broadcast, and the bold mandate it carried: "to be the voice of New York." A great deal has changed since then, but our ambitions remain the same: lifting up the voices of everyone who calls this region home, and building a platform where the city itself can speak, listen, and be heard.

Thank you for keeping us strong as we step forward into the next 100 years. Your investment in New York Public Radio is an investment in New York City and the tristate area.

A CENTURY OF THE NEW YORK CONVERSATION

Over the last century, WNYC has grown from a small, city-owned municipal radio station into a leading producer of fact-based news and information—anchoring the civic life of the region and powering the national conversation. Today we are the nation's #1 public radio station and one of the most diverse legacy newsrooms in the country.

WNYC's digital news site Gothamist integrates text and data journalism with audio from WNYC's on-air segments. This unique multiplatform approach helps our journalists reach one of the largest audiences in the region. At a time when there are ever-fewer news outlets and reporters, locally and nationwide, we reached more people with timely, free, and accessible public service journalism. In FY24 we were a leader in coverage of the April 5 earthquake that shook the metro area, and the first to report on the MTA's new congestion pricing plan, among other impactful work.



A massive investigation into sexual abuse at Rikers Island showed that city officials had ignored decades of detainee abuse by guards and jail staffers, and identified current guards who were accused of rape. In response, city leaders promised new legislation and vowed to hold investigations. Jail officials also reassigned accused guards out of the women's jail. The scope of abuse puts the Rikers scandal in the same category as other large-scale institutional abuse such as USA Gymnastics and Columbia University.

WNYC established a new earlycareer reporting fellowship on the Community Partnerships desk, as part of our commitment to fostering the next generation of public media journalists. Our first fellow has produced a powerful body of work, including "Suds and Civics," an innovative project that turned laundromats across the region into hubs for civic dialogue.

In the first long-form feature to be released on NYC NOW, WNYC's new local news podcast, reporter Jessica Gould produced a months-long investigation into how the New York City school system works against students with dyslexia.

NYC NOW published "Imminent **Danger,"** a five-part investigation

Within days of an **investigation into** citywide "insurance redlining," lawmakers vowed to ban property insurers from making decisions based on tenants' sources of income, including Section 8 vouchers. Nine months after publication, state lawmakers passed anti-discrimination laws illegalizing the practice.

On June 17, 2024, the NJ state attorney general indicted George **Norcross** for "extorting others through threats and fear of economic and reputational harm." The indictment was significantly advanced by the accountability reporting of Nancy Solomon and the newsroom team—with the findings citing Solomon's groundbreaking podcast Dead End.








Terrestrials, Radiolab's kids' show, is now available on PBS Learning Media. Produced with our partners at WNET, this collaboration includes companion education resources for children and educators, extending the show's impact.



Radiolab made history with its episode "Zoozve," about a strange object orbiting Venus. Radiolab and the IAU also mounted a project for listeners to name another quasi moon, drawing nearly 3,000 submissions from more than 90 countries, and demonstrating the show's profound impact in facilitating global engagement with the sciences.



"We Don't Talk About Leonard," a special On The Media series in partnership with ProPublica, explored the influence of farright activist Leonard Leo on the American judiciary. The project won a duPont-Columbia University Award, among the highest honors in journalism.
